## South Borough Primary School

### Summary of Pupil Premium Grant Spending 2016/17

This document outlines a summary of how South Borough Primary School is spending its Pupil Premium funding allocation for the financial year 2016-17

#### What is Pupil Premium?

Pupil Premium is a stream of funding that a school receives in addition to its main funding. The Government believes that the Pupil Premium is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM), children in care (CiC) and children from service families (CSF), and their peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

The school receives an allocation for children that are eligible for free school meals (FSM) or have been in the past 6 years (Ever 6), are looked after by the state or who have parents in the services.

The pupil premium funding for this year is planned to be spent on the following resources to support pupils in all areas of their learning, development and their well-being:

- Resources and staffing to support pupil premium children with additional needs.
- Breakfast club offer of free places for key pupils and families to increase the attendance of persistent non-attendees and to develop the pupils' readiness to learn.
- Additional TA support for key pupil premium groups – writing interventions, reading intervention and maths interventions.
- ICT resources to support learning.
- Enrichment activities to widen experiences and knowledge including funding for trips and visits.
- Specific interventions and 'on top' of support in addition to normal lessons.
